Subject: AB 1985: Hate Crimes - Law Enforcement Policies

When does AB 1985 become law?

• The Governor signed AB 1985 on June 13, 2018. The bill does not have an urgency clause, so it becomes effective January 1, 2019.

What does AB 1985 mean for law enforcement agencies and POST?

- AB 1985 amends Section 422.56 of the Penal Code to clarify that a disability is protected under the law <u>regardless of whether it is temporary, permanent, congenital, or acquired by</u> heredity, accident, injury, advanced age, or illness.
- AB 1985 adds Section 422.87 to the Penal Code to require that <u>any local law enforcement</u> <u>agency that updates an existing hate crime policy or adopts a new hate crime policy to include, among other things, the model policy framework developed by POST and any content that the commission may revise or add in the future, including any policy, definitions, response and reporting responsibilities, training resources, and planning and prevention methods.
 </u>

Recommendations

- POST recommends that agencies thoroughly familiarize themselves with the policy requirements of <u>AB 1985</u>.
- POST is currently in the process of updating its Hate Crimes Policy Guidelines and model
 policy framework. POST anticipates that this revision will be completed in Spring 2019.
 Agencies may want to consider postponing any update or adoption of hate crime policies until
 POST publishes the revised Hate Crimes Policy Guidelines. POST will provide a bulletin
 announcing its publication.
